Both court reporters and interpreters are licensed by the Texas judiciary.

Court Reporter

I. Educational requirements

- a. High school diploma, GED, or equivalent
- b. Pass certification exam
 - 1. Skills portion
 - a. Stenograph
 - 2. Written knowledge portion
 - a. Rules

II. Ongoing education

a. 10 hours of continued education over each two-year period

III. Average income

- a. Varies by city, skill, etc.
- b. Rough average is \$40,000-\$60,000 per year.

IV. How long to become a court reporter

a. Self-paced, but anticipate about 18 months of study and practice to pass the exam.

V. Other relevant information

- a. Must pass background check
- b. Reporters are in high demand.

Interpreter

I. Educational requirements

- a. Exam orientation course
 - 1. Six-hour course
- b. Application for licensure
- c. Commission approved exam

II. Ongoing education

a. 16 hours of continued education over each two-year period

III. Average income

- a. Broad range
- b. Anticipate \$40,000-\$60,000 per year, but income can far exceed \$60,000

IV. How long to become an interpreter?

a. No firm timeline–however long it takes to complete the course and pass the certifications.

V. Other relevant information

- a. Must pass background check
- b. Interpreters are in high demand.
